This Book List is intended to provide parents and caregivers with information and advice on how to have conversations with their children about sexuality and relationships. But How'd I Get in There in the First Place? (Deborah Roffman)

Provides information for parents on how to have conversations about pregnancy and childbirth with their young children.

For Goodness Sex (Al Vernacchio)

Explores the challenges teens and young adults face in the 21st century, including healthy sexuality, body image, and self-esteem.

From Diapers to Dating (Debra W. Haffner)

Offers advice and practical techniques to help parents identify and communicate values about sexuality to their children, from infancy through adolescence.

Girls and Sex (Peggy Orenstein)

Draws on in-depth interviews with young women, psychological experts, and research to examine the reality of girls' sex lives in the modern world.

Hold On to Your Kids: Why Parents Matter (Gordon Neufeld and Gabor Mate)

Explains the causes of the breakdown of parental influence that families experience. Provides advice on ways to "reattach" to children, establish the proper hierarchy in the home, make kids feel safe and understood, and earn loyalty and love from children.
